Defense Production Sharing Agreement (DPSA)

In 1956, the United States and Canada sign the **Defense Production Sharing Agreement (DPSA)**, naming CCC as Canada's designated contracting authority for the agreement.



Primary Objectives of DPSA Program

1

Bring U.S. DoD and Canadian suppliers together through contracts based on mutually beneficial terms and conditions

Guarantee the credibility and performance of Canadian
suppliers awarded U.S. DoD
contracts

Provision of pre and post contract services to effectively deliver financial and time efficiencies to U.S. DoD

Supporting Legislative and Bilateral Agreements

DFARS 225.870 - Contracting with Canadian Suppliers

DFARS 225.870-4(a) – Purchases from Canadian suppliers shall be made through CCC

DFARS 225.870-1a - Contracts endorsed by and awarded to CCC have a guarantee of performance by the Government of Canada

DFARS 215.403-I ((c)()(4)(C) - Waiver of requirements for submission of cost or pricing data when contracting through CCC.

DFARS 225.872-1 - Waiver of Buy America Act for Canadian materials and supplies used in defense equipment.

DFARS 252.225-7013 - Most Canadian products imported into the U.S. for defense are exempt from U.S. customs duties. Applies to all US DoD contracts over simplified threshold of \$250K USD

Domestic Industrial Base

- DFARS 225.870-1 Canada is part of the defense industrial base
- <u>50 USC 4552 (7)</u> "Domestic source" means a business concern that performs in the United States or Canada
- GAO/NSIAD-94-74 Since its reactivation in 1985, DoD's DPA Title III has considered Canada to be a "domestic source" as a matter of policy

Canada's foreign military sales agency

- CCC is the conduit to a reliable extended North American defence industrial base.
- Contracting with Canada is governed by the U.S.-Canada Defense Production Sharing Agreement (1956).
- DFARS 225.870 states contracts over the simplified acquisition threshold of USD\$250,000 with Canadian suppliers are to be awarded through the CCC.

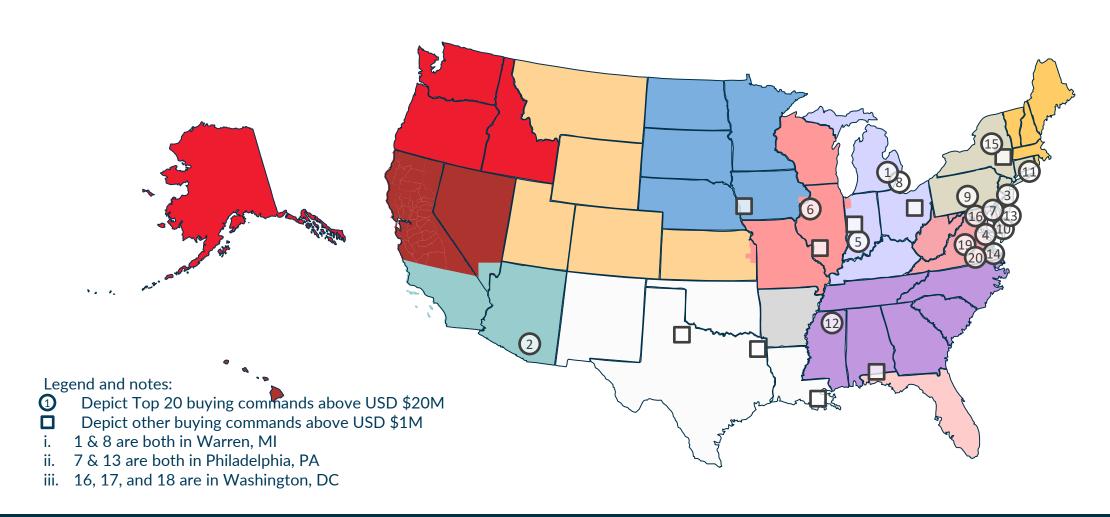

Myth Buster

Canada is considered part of the domestic industrial base

- DFARS 225.870-1 Canada is part of the defense industrial base
- GAO/NSIAD-94-74 Since its reactivation in 1985, DoD's DPA Title III has considered Canada to be a "domestic source" as a matter of policy



Myth Buster

Contracting with Canada is entrenched in the DFARS and the Buy America Act is not applied to the defence sector

• DFARS 225.870 - Contracting with Canadian Suppliers



Myth Buster

A Canadian Supplier is not required have an American presence to sell to the US DoD as they considered part of the domestic industrial base

• <u>50 USC 4552 (7)</u> "Domestic source" means a business concern that performs in the United States or Canada



Key Takeaways

- The DPSA program operates at no cost to both Industry and the US DoD
- The DPSA gives Canadian firms privileged access to the US market
- CCC is proactive in our engagement with DoD on these agreements that support the interchangeability of equipment necessary for the defense of United States and Canada
- CCC assesses a supplier's capabilities in meeting the terms of a U.S. DoD contract and pricing to provide value for money for U.S. DoD Acquisition ecosystem
- Government of Canada guarantee that goods/services will be completed in accordance with the contract terms and conditions, reduces procurement risks for U.S. DoD
